

IBEI Graduation Talk (Barcelona September 6, 2021)

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Good afternoon.

Dear outgoing 2020-2021 class students, dear director, colleagues, families, and friends.

However, we still had the chance to have hybrid sessions, and go back to the classrooms, which we were all longing for.

This also came with a lot of specific issues: trying to make out who was behind the mask, keeping the windows and doors open even if it was freezing outside, and sometimes wondering where the online students were...

During these months, you also had to put up with the usual readings, paper assignments, exams, presentations, writing your thesis, doing fieldwork, collecting data, and you also had to deliver these various activities online.

It is rather the beginning of a new, perhaps even more exciting, and unpredictable journey that will lead you to the next steps.

In any case, you will all walk through new doors and face new opportunities and challenges.

It is difficult to tell what tomorrow may bring to you and us all, or how 'normality' will look like in the near future.

I do believe that you will encounter challenges and uncertainty. Life is inherently uncertain.



This should not be an obstacle but rather an opportunity to be creative and innovative, and to continue learning.

Also, and the pandemic has made it very clear, cooperation, teamwork, solidarity, and empathy are crucial to overcome all difficulties.

Always bear in mind that:

'Everybody you meet is fighting a battle you know nothing about. Be kind. Always.'

Don't forget to be kind to yourselves too.

My hope is that, in the end, among the messages that stand the test of time are that dedication, hard work and solidarity pay off.

I strongly believe, going by your antecedents and the manner you have conducted yourselves over these months, that you will surely overcome all obstacles and make the most of the opportunities.

The adaptability, flexibility, and commitment that you have shown and that you will soon bring to the world are vital.

Rarely before has the world so desperately required the skills that are essential in the disciplines represented by this class.

They certainly come at a most appropriate time.

Whatever course your future takes, we all hope that you will look back on your time at IBEI as having provided the right tools for you to meet and deal with the tests and opportunities that life presents, and make your objectives become a reality.
